Usaha Tangkis Ancaman Siber Sentiasa Dipertingkatkan

KUALA LUMPUR, 29 Jun (Bernama) -- Usaha berterusan bagi menangkis pelbagai ancaman dan serangan siber sentiasa dipertingkatkan dengan mengukuhkan kesiapsiagaan Prasarana Maklumat Kritikal Negara (CNII), persidangan Dewan Negara diberitahu Isnin.

Timbalan Menteri Sains, Teknologi dan Inovasi, Datuk Dr. Abu Bakar Mohamad Diah berkata, Dasar Keselamatan Siber Negara telah digubal untuk memperkasakan keselamatan infrastruktur CNII yang memberi impak kepada pertumbuhan ekonomi, kesejahteraan sosial dan kestabilan negara.

"Persekitaran siber yang selamat akan merancakkan lagi aktiviti perniagaan serta boleh menarik pelaburan ke Malaysia," katanya ketika menjawab soalan Senator Datuk Jamilah Sulaiman.

Jamilah meminta kerajaan menyatakan sejauh mana CNII berupaya menangkis serangan siber bagi melindungi maklumat penting negara.

Katanya, CyberSecurity Malaysia juga sentiasa bekerjasama dengan Majlis Keselamatan Negara (MKN) dan CNII untuk menangani insiden serangan siber.

"Kerajaan juga telah mengeluarkan Arahan MKN 24 iaitu Mekanisme Pengurusan Krisis Siber Negara bertujuan untuk mengurus krisis siber meliputi peringkat sebelum, semasa dan selepas insiden.

"Ia juga bertujuan mencapai satu pendekatan seragam dan proaktif bagi memantau dan menangani ancaman siber secara berkesan dan menetapkan garis panduan untuk agensi kritikal membuat persiapan daripada pelbagai aspek dalam menghadapi sebarang ancaman dan serangan siber," kata Abu Bakar.

Katanya, Arahan MKN 24 disokong oleh Peraturan Tetap Operasi yang memperincikan setiap proses utama, carta aliran pengendalian insiden dan langkah yang perlu dilaksanakan oleh semua pihak terlibat dalam pengurusan krisis siber negara.

Sementara itu, Abu Bakar memberitahu kementerian menerusi CyberSecurity juga telah membangun dan sedang meningkatkan keupayaan Pusat Penyelidikan Malware yang dikendalikan pakar malware.

Beliau berkata pusat itu mengumpul dan menganalisis pelbagai malware yang masuk ke negara ini agar satu sistem penyelesaian yang efektif dapat dihasilkan untuk menangani isu malware di negara ini.

Govt prepared to deal with cyber attacks

THE National Cyber Security Policy (NCSP) was regulated to ensure the safety of the nation's Critical National Information Infrastructure (CNII).

Deputy Science, Technology and Innovation Minister Datuk Dr Abu Bakar Mohamad Diah said the amendments would spur the economic growth, social welfare and national stability.

"A secure cyber environment would boost the online business activities, as well as pulling the investors in," he said when answering questions posed by Senator Datuk Jamilah Sulaiman at Dewan Negara here.

Jamilah had urged the government to state CNII's capability to tackle cyber attacks, especially in protecting the nation's important information.

Abu said CyberSecurity Malaysia works

with the National Security Council (MKN) and CNII to be the shield from cyber attacks.

"The government had issued the MKN 24 Order, which is the national cyber crisis management mechanism that aims to manage cyber crisis before, during and after the incident .

"It also aims to achieve a standardised and proactive approach in monitoring and addressing cyber threats effectively and establish guidelines for agencies to be prepared from various aspects of threats, including cyber attacks," Abu said.

Abu added the MKN 24 Order is supported by the standing operational rule which emphasises on every major process, incident control flow charts and measures to be taken by all parties involved in the management of a national cyber crisis.

Meteorological Dept to conduct cloud seeding

TO make up for the lack of rain and the dry season, the Meteorological Department will resort to cloud seeding operations for cooler weather.

The department would wait for the cue from the National Security Council, which would put forward requests for cloud seeding operations, said its commercial and corporate services division director, Dr Mohd Hisham Mohd Anip.

The department is, however, uncertain of the number of operations it would carry out as it depends on the condition of the atmosphere and suitability of clouds.

"What we are facing now is the southwest monsoon season and its atmosphere is not suitable due to its stability, and we have to find the right clouds.

"Even if we do it, the success rate will not be high. However, if we are asked by the council to do so, we will proceed," he said yesterday.

With the hot and dry season, haze is expected to make a comeback.

Satellite observations, he said, revealed very small numbers and isolated hotspots of forest fires from neighbouring countries.

"In July and August, we expect an increase in hotspots and we will be hit by haze. It is normal for Malaysia to be affected by the haze due to smoke from forest fires, but we cannot determine if it happens naturally or otherwise due to the dry and hot weather."

"This problem does not only stem from other countries, but also activities of our own. People should refrain from open burning."

Hisham described the weather situation as normal every year, as it occurred from the end of May to early September.

The maximum temperature during this season will be between 33°C and 35°C, slightly higher compared with the normal 32°C.

"It won't be as bad as last year, when the highest temperature recorded was 38°C."

There would be lesser rainfall during this period, about 100mm to 150mm, except for the north of the peninsula and west Sabah.

In **Johor Baru**, the dry spell has taken a toll on many people, especially children.

Aside from having to gradually shield themselves with bags or fanning themselves with notebooks, schoolchildren are doing anything to stay cool.

When the *New Straits Times* observed the end of the school day in the afternoon, many school children either brought along an umbrella or wore headscarves to shield themselves from the scorching sun.

State Health and Environment Committee chairman Datuk Ayub Rahmat has issued an advisory to Johoreans to be wary of their health and keep themselves hydrated during the dry spell.

"If possible, stay indoors. Avoid being outdoors too much as this could cause heatstroke. Drink lots of water, while Muslims who are fasting should drink lots of water during *sahur*," he said.

In **Seremban**, Syarikat Air Negeri Sembilan director Wan Rasdi Wan Ismail yesterday said all dams, except the Gemencheh Dam, were at normal levels.

"Although the Gemencheh Dam recorded below critical level, we will be able to supply water from the Sawah Raja water treatment plant to the affected areas, Gemencheh and Rembau district through the newly installed 900mm pipeline.

"Besides, we only extract two million gallons of raw water from the Gemencheh Dam now instead of eight million gallons. This will slowly recover the dam's water level."
