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## Nine DVI personnel return from Amsterdam

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**PETALING JAYA:** After two weeks of conducting post-mortem on bodies and parts of bodies recovered from the MH17 crash site, nine of the Ministry of Health Disaster Victim Identification (DVI) personnel returned home yesterday morning from Amsterdam.

Also with them were three police personnel, an officer from the Defence Ministry and another from the **Chemistry Department**.

Another 10 DVI members from the Crisis Preparedness and Response Centre (CPRC) are still at Amsterdam to assist the International DVI team to identify the bodies and the parts positively.

Deputy Health Minister Datuk Seri Dr Hilmi Yahaya, Health Director-General (DG) Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah and Deputy Health DG Datuk Dr Jeyandran Sinnadurai were at the KL International Airport with several other Health Ministry officials and police officers to welcome those who arrived at 6.30am.

"We still have our CPRC

members in Amsterdam and they will return once their mission is accomplished," said Hilmy.

It is learnt that the authorities will inform the Malaysian ambassador in Holland on the bodies positively identified.

Three weeks after Flight MH17 was shot down with 298 people on board, the body of Penangite Elaine Teoh, 27, is believed to have been positively identified by forensic experts in the Netherlands.

On Saturday, Defence Minister Datuk Seri Hishamuddin Hussein was reported stating that he believes that it is impossible that an air-to-air missile had been used to shoot down the plane with conclusion based on military intelligence and the salvaged parts of the ill-fated MAS aircraft.

"It was a surface-to-air missile, and in that area, such a system could belong to the Ukrainian side or the rebel forces. The separatists could be supplied by Russia," he said, adding that the type of surface-to-air missile that was in the area was the BUK system but other possibilities are still under investigation.

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## Golf courses, swimming pools may face water restrictions

**PETALING JAYA** — The six-hour restriction on car wash operators in Selangor could be extended to other industries which consume large quantities of water.

National Water Services commissioner Datuk Marimuthu Nadason is proposing for golf courses, laundries and swimming pool operators to also do their part in conserving water.

“The situation is getting critical and we need something more concrete, such as imposing surcharges on swimming pool operators, which we are planning to do,” he said.

Marimuthu said he was vouching for a variety of measures to curb wastage of treated water, as the likelihood of another

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water rationing exercise was increasing.

“There are a lot of questions the Water Services Commission (SPAN) is asking. For example, there are many golf courses in Selangor. Are these golf courses using valuable treated water or water from rain?” he asked.

He was responding to a Sunday Mail report yesterday in which Klang MP Charles Santiago called for car wash operations to be banned for the time being to prioritise water usage for drinking, cooking, and hy-

giene purposes.

Santiago said SPAN had the legal authority to intervene and halt car washing operations and he urged the body to step in and intervene in the matter.

While Marimuthu acknowledged that no official decision had been reached, he said he was pushing for such changes in his capacity as commissioner at SPAN.

On concerns that water from mining ponds in the state may not be safe for consumption, he said it was all a matter of treating the water through the proper processes.

Marimuthu, who is also SPAN’s consumer education and protection committee chair-

man, proposed the introduction of rainwater catchment systems in residential homes.

He also welcomed the Meteorological Department’s forecast of rain throughout the interior Peninsular Malaysia this week but said it was too early to see if it would have an effect on the water levels at dams throughout Selangor.

“It depends on where the rain falls, on the right place near the dam. It won’t be of much help if it is somewhere else,” he said.

Khairul Najib Ibrahim, an officer at the Meteorological Department National Weather Centre, said isolated showers and thunderstorms were expected in Selangor during the afternoons.
