Don: Excessive heat may have led to hailstorm

PETALING JAYA: Excessive heat from the Urban Heat Island (UHI) effect in the Klang Valley may have contributed to Friday's hailstorm.

Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia Climatology and Oceanography expert Prof Dr Fredolin Tangang said UHIs were formed as cities tend to absorb heat more and warm up faster than surrounding areas.

Additional heat and moisture from UHI increased the likelihood of thunderstorms and might intensify hailstorm in cities, he said.

Dr Fredolin said there were no specific studies on hailstorms in

Malaysia and that his general assessment was based on studies around big cities in other countries.

Storms are not uncommon during the monsoon periods from April to May and September to October.

But hail, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, forms when strong thunderstorm updrafts carry water droplets well above the freezing level in the atmosphere.

The freezing forms a hailstone which can get bigger as more moisture freezes onto it.

Hailstorms occur when the hail-

stones become too heavy for the updraft to support them.

To a question, Dr Fredolin said he was uncertain if the Klang Valley or Malaysia was at risk of having more hailstorms in the future.

However, the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's (IPCC) latest report indicated that moisture availability in the atmosphere increases as global warming intensifies.

With the availability of both heat and moisture in a future warmer climate, there may be a higher likelihood in the increase of storm fre-

quency and intensity in bigger cities. Dr Fredolin was the IPCC's Working Group I vice-chairman from 2008 to 2015.

The Malaysian Meteorological Department recorded 60.2mm of rainfall between 4pm and 7pm in Kuala Lumpur and Selangor during the hailstorm on June 3.

Strong winds of up to 46.8kph was also recorded at 5pm.

The Science, Technology and Innovation Ministry has reiterated that although hailstorms are not uncommon, they are usually localised and last less than 20 minutes.

■ Selia-Tek berhasrat hasilkan produk pengganti import

Selia-Tek Sdn Bhd (Selia-Tek), syarikat pengeluar produk plastik dan peralatan perubatan, berhasrat untuk muncul sebagai syarikat yang menghasilkan produk pengganti import bagi kegunaan industri di dalam negara berikutan pertumbuhan pesat serta prospek industri yang memberangsangkan.

Pengarah Urusannya, Kasim Sotin berkata, bagi merealisasikan perkara berkenaan, pihaknya membuat pelaburan bagi tujuan penyelidikan dan pembangunan (R&D) untuk mengeluarkan produk berkualiti tinggi selain perlu diuji supaya menepati standard ditetapkan oleh pasaran semasa.

Beliau berkata, kerjasama bersama universiti awam

tempatan turut memberikan impak positif kepada pengendalian operasinya kerana banyak kajian bersama yang dilakukan bersama memberikan maklum balas bagi pengeluaran produk yang lebih berinovasi dan efisien.

“Selain itu, kami juga mempunyai Jabatan R&D sendiri di mana usaha serta inisiatif terhadap pembangunan produk baharu dan peningkatan kemampuan produk sedia ada sentiasa dilakukan dengan kaedah penyelesaian kos yang lebih berkesan.

“Malah, dengan pengalaman dimiliki seperti tender pelbagai jenis kontrak Tenaga Nasional Berhad (TNB) termasuk pembekalan aksesori kabel secara pukal yang diimport. Semasa program vendor dimulakan, TNB

nyaksikan semua kabel pada masa itu ditukar kepada kabel ditebat, menyebabkan aksesori dibekalkan kepada firma itu juga perlu ditukar.

“Pada masa itu, satu syarat dikenakan TNB adalah pembekal perlu mengeluarkan produk sendiri. Maka, anak syarikat Selia-Tek Industries Sdn Bhd ditubuhkan pada

1995 untuk mengeluarkan dan membekal aksesori kabel kepada TNB,” katanya kepada Bisnes Metro di sini, baru-baru ini.

Menurutnya, keadaan ketika itu agak sukar kerana pihaknya perlu menghasilkan secara domestik yang akhirnya membawa kepada usaha untuk membangunkannya menerusi usaha sama dengan SIRIM dan beberapa universiti tempatan hingga terhasilnya produk yang digunakan pada hari ini.

Kasim berkata, dalam memperkukuhkan syarikat pengeluaran Bumiputera itu, Selia-Tek turut mempelbagaikan kepakarannya termasuk menerokai pengeluaran produk perubatan pakai buang sekitar 10 tahun lalu.

“Kami mendapat kontrak bagi membekalkan picagari kepada Kementerian Kesihatan, menerusi Pharmaniaga Bhd. Itu adalah antara penyumbang terbesar pendapatan syarikat pada ketika ini.

“Penguasaan yang membebangkan bagi segmen produk perubatan pakai buang ini, memberikan jumlah jualan antara RM35 hingga RM40 juta setahun dengan sumbangannya adalah kira-kira 60 peratus daripada perolehan syarikat,” katanya.

Selain itu, Selia-Tek turut menembusi pasaran luar negara menerusi bantuan Perbadanan Pembangunan Perdagangan Luar Malaysia (MATRADE) yang menyaksikannya syarikat Bumiputera itu kini membekalkan aksesori kabel ke Kemboja.

Transforming cybersecurity challenges into new opportunities

Predicting the future is a challenging task. But as the world enters a new digital era, most of us would agree that cybersecurity is on the cusp of exponential growth, driven by the Internet of Things (IoT) and mobile communication.

Leading research company Markets and Markets estimates that the global cybersecurity market will grow to US\$170bil (RM696.9bil) by 2020, at a Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) of 9.8% from 2015 to 2020 with aerospace, defence, and intelligence vertical industries among the largest contributors to cybersecurity solutions.

As Malaysia pushes ahead with its transformation to become a developed Digital Economy by 2020, cybersecurity will inevitably emerge as a new source of economic growth. According to the latest ICT Satellite Account figures released by the Department of Statistics in late 2015, contribution of the digital economy to Malaysia's national gross domestic product (GDP) reached 17% in 2015.

Market research firm Gartner also projects that global spending on IT security will hit US\$101bil (RM414.3bil) by 2018; while International Data Corporation (IDC) has identified that the hot areas for growth in cybersecurity include cloud security, security analytics; threat intelligence and mobile security. In particular, cloud security market will be the leading sector for cybersecurity spending, expected to be worth US\$8.7bil (RM35.6bil) by 2019.

As the statistics above clearly show, cybersecurity will underpin the future growth of any digital economy and Malaysia should be ready to capitalise on this imminent trend. Cyberspace encompasses critical infrastructures, industries, communications, transportation, commerce, and national defence.
