'State-level enforcers ignored info on violations'

DAMNING: Satellite images of illegal land clearing in Camerons given to Pahang govt

THE Natural Resources and Environment Ministry dis-closed damning revelations yesterday when it said it had shared intelligence on illegal land clearing in Cameron Highlands with enforcement agencies, but was ignored.

Alerts issued to en-forcement agencies in-cluded real-time images of rogue farmers blatant-ly clearing forest reserve land.

The ministry said it had, since last year, tried to help the Pahang government by sharing in-telligence, as it could only do so

telligence, as it could only do so much when it came to land matters under the state's jurisdiction.

"We were told by enforcers at the state level that they wanted to carry out their own enforcement, using what they termed the 'friendly approach'," Its deputy minister, Datuk Seri Dr James Dawos Mamit, told the New Sunday Times yesterday.

aid: "It is perplexing, considering the carnage that's happening up there. Why would they want to use the soft approach? "Using kid gloves is another rea-son why the laws were not en-forced," James said.

He concurred with NST's findings that some 6,000ha of jungle had been ravaged by greedy busi-nessmen. The damage done to the highlands covered an area larger

highlands covered an area larger than Putrajaya.

This, he said, was evident in the images provided by the Science, Technology and Innovation Min-istry's Malaysian Remote Sensing cy (MRSA), which it had been collating.

The ministry, James said, had been using the remote sensing method to obtain data on land-

clearing activities in Cameron Highlands. "We have satellite im-ages on the current sit-EXCLUSIVE

uation in Cameron High-lands and before it was ravaged by greedy farmers. The remote sensing technol-ogy also helps the ministry identify sensitive and 'hot' areas susceptible to encroachment.

"Among other things, the satel-lite imagery also gives us vital in-formation, including which areas are prone to landslides. With this information, we would be able to warn villagers much earlier," he

However, the remote sensing sys tem has one drawback. Sometim data captured by the satellite

would only be available several days later.
Still, James said saving the high

lands was the responsibility of the authorities there and that there was no point having state-of-theart technology if state enforcement agencies chose not to discharge their duties.

"Enforcement officers should shoulder their responsibilities without fear or favour. In this case, we had noticed the rapid changes

we had noticed the rapid changes over several years from the data that was collected by MRSA." Noting the importance of taking immediate action against illegal operators, James said the ministry would use helicopters with "go teams" on board to conduct aerial surveillance.
"It would be more efficient for us

rveillance. "It would be more efficient for us to carry out enforcement using he

licopters, because we can send teams in once they spot illegal activities taking place

"If we were to take action solely based on satellite data, we will lose precious time.

James said they would be mon-itoring all areas, including areas given Temporary Occupation Li-cences (TOLs) to ensure farmers did not go beyond their allocated

The MRSM monitors development activities on environmental-ly-sensitive areas in the country Accordingly, reports would be sub-mitted on a regular basis for ac-tivities affecting areas such as wa-ter catchments, highlands, forest reserves and wetlands. Yesterday, NST had front-paged a

report saying that authorities be-lieved there were no less than 6,000ha of illegally cleared land in the highlands, three times more than stated under a comprehensive development plan for the high-lands issued in 2003.

The plan had promised sustainable use of land, allowing agricultural activities to be carried out under TOLs.

The huge extent of illegal cle

ing was blamed on licence holders blatantly expanding their farms be-yond the permitted acreage.

The extent of the damage said to be equivalent to about 8.4 million football fields.

Authorities have also warned of a major disaster on an "unimagin-able scale" in Cameron Highlands in the next five to 10 years if nothing was done to save it.

Start wooing voters now for GE14, Johor MB tells state BN

JOHOR BARU: Johor Barisan Nasional needs to start wooing voters and understand their inspirations to better prepare the coalition for the 14th general election, said state chief Datuk Seri Mohamed Khaled Nordin.

Mohamed Khaled said the coalition needed to re-invent itself and admitted that it no longer enjoyed strong support like before.

"We have several strategies to win back the voters," he said, adding that Umno needed MCA to work closely with it to woo back the Chinese voters.

Mohamed Khaled, who is also state Umno chairman, said this at a press conference at the closing of the two-day Johor Umno convention here yesterday.

The Mentri Besar added that several changes were needed and must be implemented in order to attract voters, especially first-time voters, stating that there was a "huge dip" from the Chinese vote in Johor in last year's general election.

On the other hand, Mohamed Khaled said, Umno continued to receive strong support from the Malays while the votes from Indians remained steady.

"We have to come up with programmes and activities to attract voters as they will determine our survival in the coming elections." he added.

Khaled also announced the appointment of Johor Baru Umno chairman Tan Sri

Shahrir Samad as chairman of the newlyformed Johor Institute for Strategy, Economic Advancement and Democracy (Jisead) thinktank.

Mohamed Khaled said the institute would help Umno and the state government on issues and problems related to the party in its bid to gain voter support.

Among others, Jisead would provide ways to increase Malay participation in the economic and wealth creation sectors.

Separately, Mohamed Khaled said Johor was ready to face the occurrence of floods during the monsoon season, adding that all relevant agencies have been directed to be on stand-by.
