TN50 vision for SMEs attainable: Matrade CEO

KUALA LUMPUR: Matrade CEO Datuk Dzulkifli Mahmud said the National Transformation 50 (TN50) vision can be an attainable goal for small and medium enterprises (SME), if the right resources are provided.

He said technology is a driving force for businesses, and procuring technologies from overseas and sourcing and developing technology locally, can be instrumental in increasing the competitive advantage of local products in the global exports market.

Dzulkifli, who was speaking after officiating a briefing entitled "TN50: Malaysia 2050 Smart Communities" by the Academy of Sciences Malaysia, said locally sourced technology will also reduce reliance on foreign expertise and workforce.

TN50 is a futuristic policy roadmap for economic and social development envisioned by Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Abdul Razak for the next 30 years, after the expiration of Vision 2020. Exports is seen as a core economic factor for growth for the TN50 vision.

On the cost SMEs have to bear in order to procure and produce such technologies, Dzulkifli said more investments inflow into such companies and financial aid from financial institutions is necessary to achieve this.

Matrade is engaging in dialogues with

stakeholders from various sectors in an effort to enhance exports with automation, data mining, digital and creative platforms, financial technology, fitness, biotechnology and pharmaceutical being some of the sectors it is looking at.

"These are some initiatives to prepare SME entrepreneurs and exporters to prepare themselves for TN50," he said.

Dzulkifli said it is essential to study the demands from other countries and match

our supplies to those needs through exports. He said Matrade is hopeful that more local entrepreneurs will explore the international exports market Earlier, in the briefing conducted by

Episod baru hujan lebat bulan depan

Ruala Lumpur: Jabatan Meteorologi Malaysia (MetMalaysia) menjangkakan berlaku lagi satu episod hujan lebat yang boleh membawa banjir bulan depan.

Ketua Pengarahnya Datuk Che Gayah Ismail berkata, kebiasaannya pada musim tengkujuh akan berlaku empat sehingga lima episod hujan lebat.

"Kini empat episod hujan lebat sudah berlaku dengan yang terakhir pada 20 hingga 25 Januari.

"Sehubungan itu MetMalaysia menjangkakan berlaku satu lagi episod hujan lebat bagi musim tengkujuh kali ini yang dijangka berakhir awal Mac ini, " katanya ketika dihubungi semalam. Menurut beliau lagi mulai 26 sehingga 1 Februari, hujan akan berkurangan di negeri pantai timur Semenanjung dan akan tertumpu di bahagian barat Sarawak dan timur Sabah.

"Tiada luruan sejuk dijangka untuk tempoh itu, namun kehadiran kawasan tekanan rendah (Bornoe Vortex) di barat Sarawak dan pembentukan sistem tekanan rendah di tenggara Filipina akan mempengaruhi cuaca di Sabah dan Sarawak.

"Selain itu amaran angin kencang antara 40 hingga 50 kilometer sejam dan ombak setinggi 3.5 meter masih lagi berterusan sehingga 28 Januari bagi perairan negeri pantai timur Semenanjung, Sarawak dan Sabah," katanya.

Menurut Che Gayah, terdapat beberapa faktor yang menggalakkan pembentukan awan hujan bagi episod hujan lebat semasa musim tengkujuh seperti luruan sejuk dari Tanah Besar China iaitu tekanan tinggi Siberia, angin timuran dari Lautan Pasifik Barat yang kencang dan lembap serta terdapat kawasan bertekanan rendah di Laut China Selatan.

Sementara itu, berdasarkan rekod Pusat Cuaca Nasional MetMalaysia, taburan hujan dari November sehingga 26 Januari bagi semua negeri adalah pada kadar normal.

Brace for 'balik kampung' rush

KUALA LUMPUR — While traffic on major expressways was generally smooth yesterday, highway authorities expect the exodus to peak today ahead of the Chinese New Year tomorrow.

Streets in Kuala Lumpur were quiet yesterday as millions had headed out of the city.

PLUS Malaysia Bhd chief operating officer Mohammad Fuad Khusairi said there would be some 1.6 million vehicles on the North-South Expressway starting today.

"We anticipate the *balik kampung* rush to begin today. More cars will be on the highways," Fuad said.

"We advise the public to adhere to our travel time advisory and follow us on Twitter (@plustrafik) for updates."

Toll rebates were being offered between midnight and 6am from yesterday until next Tuesday as well as on Feb 4 and 5 on selected routes to help regulate traffic flow.

Despite an accident at Km248.3 near the Menora Tunnel yesterday evening, no lanes were closed and traffic was smooth in both directions. Traffic was also generally smooth on the Karak Highway.

However, those heading into and

leaving Singapore faced heavy traffic on the Causeway.

Motorists were warned to drive carefully due to the bad weather as the Meteorological Department predicts rain in most part of the country.

Bus and train terminals were teeming with travellers embarking on their journey home yesterday evening. Many at Bandar Tasik Selatan Terminal were eager to return to their loved ones in time for the reunion dinner tonight.

A Keretapi Tanah Melayu Bhd spokesman said tickets for the Electric Train Service were sold out until Feb 4.

"We are working to increase the train frequencies to cope with the influx of passengers," he said.

BAD WEATHER TO **CONTINUE UNTIL APRIL**

Number of evacuees in Pahang. Johor remains high

KUALA LUMPUR

HERE will be no reprieve from the weather, at least until April, as the Meteo-rological Department expects constant rainfall in April due to

changes in the monsoon season.

Its director general, Datuk Che
Gayah Ismail, said the northeast monsoon season was expected to

continue until March.
"The northeast wind will be strong and continuous heavy rain will cause floods in the peninsula's east coast and west Sarawak.

"In April and May, the country will enter a transitional phase of mon-soon, which could see rainy weather and thunderstorms in the afternoon and evening, especially in the penin-sula's west coast and Sarawak's in-terior."

However, she said less rainfall could be expected in May and June during the southwest monsoon.

The number of flood victims in Pa hang and Johor remained the high

est among the six states affected. In Segamat, floods claimed the first two victims yesterday when the bodies of a 21-year-old man and a plantation worker were recovered.

Mohd Fais Syafiq Hassan's body was found by rescuers floating in 3mdeep water, 10m from where he went missing when the boat he was on with four other people capsized on

The other casualty was plantation worker Tarmin Katimin, 58, whose body was recovered in Palong Timur, Segamat at 3.15pm yesterday.

Bandar Putra Fire and Rescue Station senior officer Mohd Aizad Ma mat said Tarmin's body was found a day after he was swept away by flood waters while riding his motorcycle

Defence Minister Datuk Seri Hishammuddin Hussein, who visited victims at Sekolah Agama Kampung Jawa here said the armed forces have set up a field hospital in SK Kampung Jawa here.

"Army medical teams are deployed to Rantau Panjang, Kelantan, and two other areas here. This is part of the armed forces' assistance for flood relief following the deployment of 6,000 armed forces personnel na-tionwide, including 1,500 in Johor." Hishammuddin said the armed forces would collaborate with Na-

tional Service Alumni Brigade mem bers and non-governmental organ isations to repair houses and bridges that were damaged in the floods.

At 6pm yesterday, 6,954 flood vic-tims from 1,993 families remained in 63 relief centres in four districts in

In Kuantan, the Chinese commu nity in Sungai Lembing raced against time to clean up their houses and shops covered in mud, ahead of tonight's Chinese New Year reunion dinner. Ho Seng Kuen, 82, said: "I was able

to move some food and small elec-

trical items to the upper floor of the house. The reunion dinner is tonight, but look at the amount of work to

clear out all the dirt," he said.

As at 4pm yesterday, 7,083 flood victims from 1,845 families sought shelter at 97 relief centres in nine districts in Pahang, with Lipis and Kuantan the worst-hit districts.

In Kota Baru, Low Chong Peng and his family's plans for a grand reunion dinner and celebration were de stroyed when their belongings were washed away by the floods.

The 63-year-old from Kampung Sungai Limau, Peringat, said new clothes, prayer items, boxes of man darin oranges and a new cupboard

were either damaged or swept away.
"Normally, the floods don't leave
such a bad effect in the village, but
this year is particularly bad," he said.

In **Kuching**, 19 longhouses in three districts are on alert. As at 2pm yesterday, there was no evacuation at the affected areas in

Sarawak Disaster Management Committee Secretariat chief Maj Ismail Mahedin said there were 3,636 residents at all longhouses in the af-

In Pitas, Sabah, four villages that were inaccessible can now be reached via road, while meals for an other four villages are still being delivered via air.

Sabah Civil Defence director Colonel Muliadi Al-Hamdi Ladin said the situation was better vesterday compared with Wednesday when access to 396 families was cut off.

In Setiawan, Perak Menteri Besar

Datuk Seri Dr Zambry Ab Kadir said the state government was mulling relocating residents who lived in flood prone areas.

He said that he had instructed the Irrigation and Drainage Department to come up with suggestions to over-come a spate of flooding incidents.


Zambry said residents of Kam-pung Padang Serai had been living in houses inundated by floodwaters for almost three months.

"The flood has yet to fully subside until today (yesterday) as their houses are located in a low-lying area," he said, adding that the state govern-ment would help to ease the burden of the flood victims.
