Bekalan elektrik 30 kilang plastik haram bakal dipotong

MPK sudah hantar senarai nama, alamat kepada ST

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Klang

Majlis Perbandaran Klang (MPK) sudah menghantar senarai nama dan alamat 30 kilang plastik haram di daerah itu kepada Suruhanjaya Tenaga (ST) untuk tujuan pemotongan bekalan elektrik ke premis terbabit.

Yang Dipertua MPK, Datuk Mohd Yasin Bidin berkata, senarai nama itu dibuat selepas pihaknya menjalankan pemeriksaan terhadap kilang berkenaan.

Katanya, MPK memerlukan kelulusan daripada ST untuk memotong bekalan elektrik agar kilang haram berkenaan tidak boleh meneruskan operasi masing-masing.

"Dalam operasi sebelum ini, kami bersama-sama Tenaga Nasional Berhad (TNB) dan Syarikat Bekalan Air Selangor (SYABAS) menjalankan operasi bersama tetapi tidak dapat melakukan pemotongan bekalan elektrik kerana belum mendapat kelulusan," katanya.

Beliau berkata demikian pada Majlis Mesra Aidilfitri MPK, di Taman Pengkalan Batu, di sini, semalam.

Mohd Yasin berkata, kilang berkenaan adalah yang berooperasi di Telok Gong, Pulau Indah serta Taman Industri Soberna Jaya.

Kilang masih beroperasi

Katanya, kebanyakan kilang haram yang disita masih meneruskan operasi secara senyap pada waktu malam kerana bekalan elektrik tidak dipotong.

"Saya rasa bekalan elektrik yang tidak dipotong adalah punca utama kilang ini sukar ditutup kerana jika tiada elektrik, mereka tidak boleh beroperasi.

"Mereka degil, tidak takut walaupun sudah disita atau dikenakan kompaun kerana mereka tahu kuasa kita sebagai pihak berkuasa tempatan (PBT) terhad, malah kalau ingin membawa kes ke mahkamah juga bukan perkara yang mudah.

"Pemotongan bekalan elektrik dilihat sebagai cara yang boleh mengekang operasi kilang haram ini," katanya.

Sementara itu, seramai 5,000 tetamu termasuk EXCO kerajaan negeri, Ahli Dewan Undangan Negeri (ADUN), ahli majlis dan orang awam menghadiri majlis mesra Aidilfitri MPK itu yang diadakan di Taman Pengkalan Batu iaitu taman rekreasi di tepi Sungai Klang.

Sebanyak 100 orang yang terdiri daripada fakir miskin serta Orang Kelainan Upaya (OKU) menerima sumbangan duit raya yang disampaikan oleh ADUN Selat Klang merangkap EXCO Kebudayaan dan Pelancongan, Peradaban Melayu dan Warisan Selangor, Datuk Abdul Rashid Asari.

KLANG – Majlis Perbandaran Klang (MPK) sudah menghantar senarai nama dan alamat 30 kilang plastik haram di daerah itu kepada Suruhanjaya Tenaga (ST) untuk tujuan pemotongan bekalan elektrik.

Yang Dipertua, Datuk Mohamad Yasid Bidin berkata, tindakan itu bagi memudahkan pihaknya menjalankan operasi peneguatuasaan.

Menurutnya, sebelum ini operasi tidak dapat dilakukan kerana tiada kelulusan daripada suruhanjaya itu.

“Kita akan menjalankan operasi secara besar-

besaran selepas mendapat kelulusan suruhanjaya berkenaan,” katanya kepada pemberita pada Majlis Mesra Aidilfitri MPK di Taman Pengakalan Batu di sini semalam.

Menurut beliau, kebanyakannya pemilik kilang haram masih berdegil dan beroperasi walaupun sudah disita dan dikenakan kompaun.

“Perkara ini berlaku kerana bekalan elektrik masih berfungsi dan mereka tahu kuasa kita terhad.

“Kita hanya boleh mengeluarkan notis amaran, kompaun dan bawa kes terbabit ke mahkamah. Jadi

mereka lebih berani bertindak,” katanya.

Mohamad Yasid memberitahu, kilang plastik itu giat beroperasi terutama di Telok Gong, Pulau Indah dan Kawasan Perindustrian Sobena di Pelabuhan Klang.

“MPK menerima banyak aduan mengenai kes pencemaran. Jadi operasi besar-besaran akan bermula tidak lama lagi bagi membendung kilang haram ini,” katanya.

Sebelum ini *Sinar Harian* melaporkan pemilik kilang plastik haram diberi amaran menutup kilang bagi mengelakkan tindakan undang-undang

Simpton sama tragedi pencemaran Sungai Kim Kim

Gas organik mungkin punca mangsa sesak nafas: Dr Dzulkefly

Kementerian Kesihatan tidak menolak kemungkinan kejadian sesak nafas dan muntah oleh 27 orang yang dimasukkan ke Hospital Sultan Ismail Johor Bahru, semalam, seakan-akan sama dengan simptom kesan pencemaran dari Sungai Kim Kim, sebelum ini.

Sehingga jam 8 malam tadi, daripada seramai 27 orang itu, 17 terdiri murid Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar dan seorang pekerja kantinnya, manakala sembilan lagi murid Sekolah Kebangsaan (SK) Pasir Gudang 4.

Menteri Kesihatan, Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad, berkata pihaknya baru dimaklumkan mengenai

kejadian berkenaan dan akan berhubung dengan Pengarah Kesihatan Negeri Johor bagi mengetahui situasi semasa.

Pencemaran gas organik

"Berdasarkan maklumat awal daripada simptom dialami murid seperti muntah dan sesak nafas, kemungkinan besar berpunca daripada pencemaran gas organik, sama seperti kes Sungai Kim Kim," katanya pada sidang media di sini, semalam.

Ditanya sama ada Kementerian Kesihatan akan mengeluarkan arahan kepada sekolah berkenaan ditutup, beliau berkata ia masih terlalu awal untuk membuat keputusan.

"Setakat ini keadaan masih terkawal, apapun kita akan pantau dan lihat situasi ini bagi mendapatkan maklumat lanjut, termasuk menentukan punca dan tahap

pencemaran udara yang berlaku," katanya.

Sementara itu, di **Pasir Gudang**, Pengurusi Jawatankuasa, Kebudayaan dan Warisan Johor, Mohd Khuzzan Abu Bakar, berkata pihak berkuasa masih menyiasat lanjut punca murid di kedua-dua sekolah itu mengalami simptom sesak nafas dan muntah.

"Pihak berkuasa seperti Unit Bahar Berbahaya (HAZMAT) bomba, Jabatan Alam Sekitar (JAS) dan Jabatan Kimia akan menyiasat lebih lanjut bagi mengenal pasti punca sebenar kejadian itu.

"Selain itu, murid yang terjejas

juga akan menjalani ujian darah bagi mengetahui apa sebenarnya yang berlaku," katanya pada sidang media di Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar, semalam.

Insiden terkawal

Mengulas lanjut, Mohd Khuzzan berkata, insiden itu terkawal dan penduduk tidak perlu panik kerana keadaan kali ini berbeza dengan tragedi pencemaran toksik Sungai Kim Kim awal Mac lalu.

"Sehingga kini, tidak ada keperluan untuk membuka bilik gerakan, namun pemantauan bertebaran akan dijalankan mulai ma-

lam ini sehingga Sabtu ini," katanya.

Sementara itu, Pengurus Jawatankuasa Hal Ehwal Agama Islam, Pertanian dan Pembangunan Luar Bandar, Tosrin Jarvanthi, yang turut meninjau keadaan Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar, berkata ber kata Majlis Agama Islam Negeri Johor akan memberi bantuan segera kepada mangsa yang terjejas.

"Mangsa yang dirawat di hospital akan menerima bantuan RM400 setiap seorang, manakala mangsa yang terjejas tetapi tidak dimasukkan ke hospital akan menerima RM200," katanya.

'Blanket ban on plastic waste will affect legal recyclers'

KUALA LUMPUR: A blanket ban on plastic waste, called by the consumer association, will hurt law-abiding plastic recyclers, as well as drive them out of business, said industry players.

The Malaysian Plastics Manufacturers Association (MPMA) and the Malaysia Plastics Recyclers Association (MPRA) also said such a move would not help the government in combating smugglers and illegal plastic recyclers.

"Recycling is crucial to

creating new value that benefits society and contributes to sustainability.

"Legal operators support Malaysia's manufacturing and export sectors in industries such as electrical and electronics, automotive and others.

"A total ban would bring the country's participation in the global economy to a halt. We will help the government to crack down on illegal operators," they said in a joint statement yesterday. – Bernama

'New pollution case in Johor under control'

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PASIR GUDANG: The Johor government is downplaying the latest air pollution incident, which saw 15 people, including 13 students, suffering breathing difficulties and vomiting.

The incident occurred at two schools – Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar and SK Pasir Gudang 4 – at about 3.40pm yesterday.

State Health, Culture and Heritage Committee chairman Mohd Khuzzan Abu Bakar said the situation at both locations was secure and safe.

"Those affected are being treated at Sultan Ismail Hospital. Thirteen are students between the ages of seven and 12, while the other two are school staff.

"The public should not panic as the authorities are monitoring the ground situation closely," he said when met at the location yesterday.

Mohd Khuzzan said the authorities would continue to monitor the air quality until tomorrow before making any decision.

"As of now, there is no need to open a disaster relief centre," he said.

In March, a toxic pollution in Sungai Kim Kim resulted in over 4,000 people falling ill, which also saw the temporary closure of 111 schools in Pasir Gudang district.

State Islamic Religious Affairs, Agriculture and Rural Development Committee chairman Tosrin Jarvanthi said the government

would hand out a special aid to those affected.

"Each receiving treatment in the hospital will get RM400. The aid will be channelled through the schools," he said..

In Putrajaya, Health Minister Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad said the ministry was aware of the inci-

dent and would closely monitor the situation.

"The symptoms look like a possibility of poisonous gas or those volatile organic gas compound ... just like the Sungai Kim Kim's incident but I need to evaluate the information to be able to comment on the matter," he said yesterday.

15 termasuk murid dikejar ke hospital

SERAMAI 15 mangsa terdiri daripada 13 murid dan dua kakitangan sekolah dikejarkan ke Hospital Sultan Ismail (HSI) Johor Bahru selepas dikeisan menjadi mangsa pencemaran udara di sini hari ini.

Kejadian tersebut dilaporkan berlaku pukul 3.39 petang di dua sekolah iaitu Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar dan Sekolah Kebangsaan Pasir Gudang 4.

Pengerusi Jawatankuasa Kesihatan, Kebudayaan dan Warisan negeri, Mohd. Khuzzan Abu Bakar berkata, bagaimanapun keadaan di kawasan terlibat kini dalam keadaan terkawal dan selamat.

“Sebanyak 15 mangsa yang terjejas dirawat di HSI. Mereka terdiri daripada 13 murid berusia antara 7 hingga 12 tahun dan dua kakitangan sekolah.

“Empat daripada mereka di rawat di Zon Merah, tiga di Zon Kuning manakala lapan yang lain di Zon Hijau,” katanya dalam sidang akbar di Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar di sini hari ini.

Hari ini penduduk di sekitar daerah ini dikejutkan dengan pencemaran udara terbaharu yang berlaku di dua sekolah berkenaan.

Mohd. Khuzzan berkata, bacaan kualiti udara yang dibuat di lokasi terlibat menunjukkan bacaan udara berada dalam paras yang baik.

“Insiden pencemaran yang berlaku hari ini berbeza sama sekali dengan insiden pencemaran sisa toksik di Sungai Kim Kim. Punca sebenar kejadian ini sedang disiasat dan akan dimaklumkan kelak.

“Pihak berkuasa akan melaksanakan pemantauan udara secara berterusan sehingga Sabtu ini sebelum membuat sebarang keputusan lanjut,” ujarnya sambil memberitahu tiada keperluan membuka bilik gerakan ben-

cana ketika ini.

Sementara itu, Pengerusi Jawatankuasa Hal Ehwal Agama Islam, Pertanian dan Pembangunan Luar Bandar negeri, Tosrin Jarvanthi memaklumkan pihaknya akan menyalurkan bantuan khas kepada mangsa terlibat.

“Bantuan RM400 akan disalurkan menerusi pihak sekolah kepada mangsa yang mendapat rawatan di hospital,” ujarnya yang turut hadir ke lokasi kejadian.

Pasir Gudang: "Tiba-tiba saya rasa pening dan muntah," kata, Muhamad Addam Azfar Azlan, 8, murid di Sekolah Kebangsaan (SK) Pasir Gudang 4, di sini.

Menceritakan saat mengalami sesak nafas, murid Tahun Dua itu, berkata pada masa itu dia seperti biasa menghadiri sesi persekolahan sebelah petang.

"Saya ke sekolah macam biasa. Kami kemudian pergi ke dewan sebab ada jamuan hari raya.

"Tak lama kemudian, ada beberapa kawan muntah dan terbaring. Saya pun rasa pening sebelum muntah. Saya rasa takut dan kemudian cikgu suruh kami semua tunggu.

"Selepas itu, kami semua dibawa ke Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar," katanya.

Ibu kepada Muhamad Addam yang mahu dikenali sebagai Nurul Aisyah, berkata dia yang bekerja bergegas ke Sekolah Agama Taman

Mawar sebaik dimaklumkan oleh pihak sekolah mengenai insiden itu.

Perlu ke hospital jika teruk

"Alhamdulillah, anak saya baik dan tidak apa-apa. Kakitangan perubatan merawatnya memaklumkan anak saya boleh dibawa pulang, namun jika keadaan menjadi buruk, dia perlu segera dibawa ke Hospital Sultan Ismail," katanya.

Sementara itu, Komander Operasi Balai Bomba dan Penyelamat (BBP) Pasir Gudang, Ibrahim Omar, berkata pihaknya menerima panggilan kecemasan pada jam 3.39 petang dan sebuah jentera dengan tiga anggota dihantar ke lokasi kejadian sebagai tindak balas pertama.

Landowner of illegal dumpsite fined

Man and factory operator plead guilty to charges

BUKIT MERTAJAM: The landowner of the illegal dumpsite in Bukit Teh was fined RM2,000 after he pleaded guilty at a Magistrate's Court here yesterday.

Also slapped with the same amount of fine was the operator of a nearby illegal factory.

The charges were read to them by a court interpreter before magistrate Shamshol Azwa Martadza.

The landowner, H'ng Boon Chai, was charged under the Seberang Prai Municipal Council (MPSP) Refuse Collection, Removal and Disposal (Municipal Council of Province Wel-

lesley) By-Laws 1994.

Meanwhile, the factory, Young Master Enterprise (M) Sdn Bhd, was charged under the MPSP Licence Fees By-Law 1980 and fined RM2,000 after a representative pleaded guilty.

Both paid the fines.

In March, *The Star* exposed a 6.5ha illegal dumpsite as big as six football fields in Bukit Teh near Machang Bubok, which was an illegal sand quarry site years ago before it turned into a marshland.

Besides plastic waste, items such as discarded furniture, construction debris and food waste have filled up

the waterlogged area.

There were also hundreds of sacks of plastic pellets piled up at the site within a privately owned land.

A wooden pallet processing factory was also found operating within the illegal dumpsite, with workers using various tools to assemble the pallets.

15 students suffer breathing difficulties

Report on cause to be issued later

JOHOR BARU: About 15 students from Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar in Pasir Gudang here suffered breathing difficulties and vomiting believed to have been caused by air pollution yesterday.

Pasir Gudang Fire and Rescue Station chief said they received a distress call at 3.39pm and sent their personnel.

"When we arrived we found about 15 students having breathing difficulties and vomiting. Five of them were sent to Sultan Ismail Hospital for treatment," he said in a statement.

A team from the hazardous material unit, or Hazmat was dispatched to the scene together with the Emergency Medical Response Service from Johor Baru.

This quick response comes after toxic pollution of Sungai Kim Kim caused over 4,000 people to fall ill and the closure of 111 schools in Pasir Gudang in March.

"Once we discover the main cause we will issue a statement," said Ibrahim.

Bantah keputusan ujian pencemaran air

Suku Bateq tak puas hati

MASYARAKAT Orang Asli suku Bateq tidak berpuas hati dengan keputusan ujian yang diumumkan Kementerian Kesihatan bahawa wabak yang melanda Kuala Koh di sini bukan berpunca daripada pencemaran air.

Justeru, mereka mahu kerajaan dan agensi berkaitan menyiasat semula perkara itu kerana mereka yakin penyakit berjangkit tersebut berpunca daripada penggunaan air tadahan bukit serta air Sungai Balai yang dipercayai mengandungi bahan kimia.

Penghulu Kampung Kuala Koh, Mohamad Pokok berkata, sebelum tahap kesihatan penduduknya terjejas, mereka sebelum ini sering menggunakan punca air sungai itu untuk minum dan memasak.

Katanya, mereka yakin air tercemar kerana jarak kawasan lombong bijih mangan terbatit

hanya 100 meter dari sungai dan tadahan air bukit.

“Kami sudah membangkitkan perkara berkenaan kepada Timbalan Perdana Menteri, Datuk Seri Dr. Wan Azizah Wan Ismail di Putrajaya, kelmarin.

“Kami tidak berpuas hati dan beliau juga ber-setuju untuk menyiasat semula perkara itu. Beliau memberi masa tiga bulan untuk membuat kajian semula dengan mengambil sampel air di lokasi itu sebelum ada keputusan muktamad,” katanya di sini hari ini.

Isnin lalu, Menteri Kesihatan, Datuk Seri Dr. Dzulkefly Ahmad mengumumkan wabak yang melanda penduduk kampung tersebut adalah demam campak dan bukannya berpunca daripada pencemaran air. Wabak itu menyebabkan 15 maut serta 112 orang menerima rawatan.

Tambah Mohamad, sampel air yang diambil jabatan terbabit juga mungkin bukan air dari Su-


ngai Balai, sebaliknya air di Sungai Lebir yang terletak lima kilometer dari kampung itu.

Katanya, sampel air yang diambil itu juga mungkin diambil selepas agak lama kejadian menimpa penduduk berlaku.

Sementara itu, guru agama Orang Asli, Majlis Agama Islam dan Adat Istiadat Melayu Kelantan (Maik), Mohd. Fazli Mamok, 31, berkata, masyarakatnya juga terkejut selepas dimaklumkan penyakit misteri yang menyebabkan beratus penduduk sakit dan 15 orang mati adalah disebabkan demam campak.

Katanya, mereka juga berharap pihak kerajaan membuat siasatan semula berhubung penyakit itu.

“Kami meragui kaum kami dijangkiti demam campak sehingga meragut nyawa. Kami Orang Asli pernah dijangkiti demam campak sebelum ini, namun tidaklah berlaku kematian kerana kami ada ubat tradisional yang dibuat sendiri,” katanya.

15 STUDENTS HAVE 'KIM KIM SYMPTOMS'

The students from a Pasir Gudang school were exposed to gas fumes

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THE Health Ministry does not discount the possibility that 15 students from Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar, Pasir Gudang, who experienced breathing difficulties and vomiting yesterday, are displaying similar symptoms to those affected by the chemical pollution of Sungai Kim Kim in March.

Minister Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad said the ministry was monitoring the case and was seeking constant updates from the Johor Health director.

"Early information on the case

showed that the symptoms could possibly be a result of contamination from organic fumes, similar to the Sungai Kim Kim case," he said here yesterday.

When asked if the ministry would issue a directive for the affected school to be closed, Dr Dzulkefly said it was too early to make such a decision.

"At this point, the situation is under control. Nevertheless, we will monitor the situation and obtain more information, including determining the cause of the pollution and its contamination levels."

Earlier in Johor Baru, five students from Sekolah Agama Taman Mawar, Pasir Gudang were rushed to the emergency unit of Sultan Ismail Hospital after complaining of nausea and breathing difficulties from exposure to unknown gas fumes at 4pm yesterday.

Pasir Gudang Fire and Rescue station chief Ibrahim Omar said 15 students showed symptoms, including vomiting and breathing problems, at 3.39pm, and an Emergency Medical Rescue Services (EMRS) with three person-

nel were dispatched to the school.

He said after arriving at the location, the personnel confirmed the incident and sent five students to the hospital for treatment.

"A hazardous material (Hazmat) team and a Johor Baru EMRS unit went to the location to help the responding team and carry out a decontamination process," he said.

Johor Health director Dr Selahuddeen Abd Aziz said five students were undergoing treatment at the hospital.

"We are carrying out checks based on the symptoms to identify the real cause of the problem," he said.

It was understood that all five students are receiving treatment at the emergency unit and the medical team is on standby.

In March, 111 schools in the Pasir Gudang district had to be closed for two weeks following the chemical pollution of Sungai Kim Kim, which caused symptoms ranging from eye irritations, chest pains, vomiting to shortness of breath.

The schools were closed on March 13 after fumes from chemical waste illegally dumped into Sungai Kim Kim, caused breathing difficulties for almost 6,000 people.

The schools were reopened following a clean-up operation of the river, and test results that revealed low levels of pollution.

Trash heroes to the rescue

Participants of Redang clean-up net 525kg of rubbish in four hours

I MUST confess: I have a tendency to lose count. I was especially reminded of this when I was part of a volunteer clean-up crew picking up trash from a beach just 2km from Berjaya's The Taaras Beach and Spa Resort on Pulau Redang. We were picking up marine debris and general rubbish and each of us were told to keep count of how many 'X' items we collected as part of the annual Redang Island Conservation Day (RICD) initiative.

I lost count more than once. In my defence, it was my first clean-up, and I was overwhelmed by the sheer amount of junk that had washed up on this isolated rocky beach, seemingly emerging out of nowhere.

I was perhaps overzealous as all I could think about was picking up as much as I could from wherever I could.

Off the top of my head, I recall finding the following: straws, aluminium cans, plastic bags, drink bottles, shoes, slippers, fishing gear, children's toys, household/industrial plastics, and even unopened cans of engine oil.

But realising there was simply too much rubbish, I started to focus my collection on plastic bottles and discarded fishing gear.

On both sessions, we had to stay behind on the island for the boat to transport the rubbish back to the resort as it had taken up all the space on the boat.

I do not recall the exact number of items I was able to collect but it would have easily been 300 bottles and 10kg of fishing equipment over two two-hour sessions.

This is over the dozens of discarded footwear and hundreds of fragments of plastic cutlery that was picked up.

Meanwhile, beneath the turquoise waters not far from our clean-up spot, over a dozen scuba divers were doing their part to preserve the environment underwater.

It was a task I imagined to be even more challenging to tackle than on land due to the current and sediment.

Underwater, they had to contend with plastic bags and bottles, ghost nets, aluminium cans, hypodermic needles, and the destructive crown-of-thorns starfish.

After sorting and cataloguing the rubbish, our leader and Trash Hero Malaysia coordinator Mohd Faisal Abdur Rani said we had found rubbish that originated from Thailand and Vietnam, presumably those that drifted across the South China Sea and

effort of 70 participants, we were able to remove 524.86kg of waste, 246.39kg of which was plastic, 78.08kg ropes, 4,645 bottles, 315 shoes/slippers, 47 straws, 28 toothbrushes, and 35 crown-of-thorns starfish.

I estimated that the total area covered would easily fit within one sq km space.

No doubt, education plays a big part in preventing waste from going into our seas and threatening the marine life but let's not forget our predilection for convenience when it comes to single-use plastics.

Returning to The Taaras with its private and pristine white sand beach and crystal clear waters was a stark contrast to all the filth that still needed clearing up just 10 minutes away by boat.

Later, I got a better understanding as to why the resort takes it upon itself to care not just for its own beach but also the surrounding areas, bearing in mind that the RICD is just one of its initiatives.

As The Taaras area general manager Pravir Mishra said, "We have Taaras guests who come from all over the world to see Redang but Redang is not just The Taaras, it is the whole island."

So we try to do our part by contributing and creating awareness to the rest of the island as well."

Another reason stems from a distinctive feature that sets The Taaras apart from other resorts, which is the Sea Turtle Research Unit (Seatruth) laboratory.

As a collaboration between The Taaras and Universiti Teknologi

Terengganu (UTM), the resort houses a laboratory for scientists to study sea turtles right at the lobby of the resort.

The lab also focuses on education and conservation work on sea turtles, which has resulted in meaningful strides in terms of protecting them.

Moreover, just further up from the beach we were cleaning up lies the marine turtle research station, Chagar Hutang Turtle Sanctuary – one of the most important centres for marine turtle research and protection in the country.

A key point highlighted by the various speakers during the presentations by UTM Seatruth, WWF Malaysia and the Tzu Chi Foundation on conservation and protection, was the impact that humans have on marine life and the rise of micro plastics.

No surprises that single-use plastics and irresponsible rubbish disposal was the common thread too.

Joining in as one of the participants for the second year in a row was RICD patron and environmentalist, Selangor princess Tengku Zatashah Sultan Sharafuddin Idris Shah, who is a champion of both the coastal and marine clean-ups.

"It was great being back in Redang for the second year. The beach clean-up was a real eye-opener and underwater, I picked up a lot of debris during my first dive.

"There wasn't much on the second dive so that was a bit of good news.

"The reason why I find RICD significant is because Redang is like paradise island. And we don't even have to go far for it. But we have to take care of it because plastic thrash is overwhelming."

As The Taaras' resident marine biologist Siva Prakash told me, the amount of trash on the beach we were at was just a fraction of what is around the entire island.

"We have done lots of beach clean-ups. And all over the world people are also doing this. But how long are we going to do this for?" he asked, adding that his experiences in the past with beach clean-ups was that he still saw the same amount of rubbish a few weeks later.

"The only way to reduce it (plastic waste) is to refuse using it. There are many other options out there, it is just a question of whether we are ready to take the responsibility."

Reducing single-use plastics for environs

State govt should take lead in campaign and promote biodegradable packaging, say advocates

MORE people are becoming aware of the link between single-use plastics and the damage the materials are causing to the environment.

A number of consumers interviewed by *StarMetro* in Ipoh said they had begun carrying their own food containers and reusable shopping bags when buying food and groceries.

Engineer Herman Iskandar Dzulkarnain Shuhaimi, 38, opted to have food packed in his own containers during Ramadan bazaar visits to help reduce plastic waste. "I want to do my part for the environment. Some traders even gave me free kuih or discounts for my effort. But some also asked why I brought my own container."

"I believe it will take a year or two for the trend to pick up.

However, slow progress is still progress," Herman Iskandar said, adding that he hoped the Perak government would create more awareness campaigns against the use of plastic.

"They should have incentives like tax reductions for traders. We need everyone to play their role in reducing the use of plastic."

Sales executive Nurul Shakila Mohamad Zain, 27, said using her own food containers was primarily about recycling and to address hygiene concerns.

"Sometimes I wonder where the polystyrene or plastic containers are stored and if the storage areas are clean."

"Maybe I am over-thinking it but at least I know the container I bring is clean. "I am definitely concerned about the impact of single-use plastics on our environment," Nurul Shakila

said, adding that she would carry at least five containers when buying takeaway food.

"Some of my friends have also taken steps to reduce the usage of plastic when they visit night markets."

"Some still use the containers provided by traders but they carry them in reusable bags. I have also asked my family to do the same."

Some traders though are adamant about using single-use containers and plastic bags because they are cheaper than the biodegradable alternatives.

"Biodegradable containers are more expensive than plastic. I can't afford them because I just started my business a few months ago," said drinks trader Amar Asyraf Yus Amirul, 27.

"But I encourage my customers to bring their own bottles to reduce



the usage of plastic cups. In return I give them a discount or a little bit more of what I am selling."

Conversely, some locals insist they recycle the plastic bags given.

"If plastic bags are free when we buy our groceries, I don't see why I should stop using them," said clerk Noor Aini Mokhtar, 30.

"I would reuse a plastic bag as

'Emulate other states and ban plastic'

THE Perak government should reverse the lifting of the ban on plastics by the previous administration.

Koperasi Alam Hijau Perak (Kohjau) chairman Assoc Prof Dr Richard Ng said the ban on plastics was to be enforced on July 1, but the decision was deferred.

At the moment, Perak's "No Plastic Bag" is only implemented every Saturday.

Ng claimed the state government was doing little to tackle the issue.

"They keep citing that more research is required as an excuse not to ban plastic as it may hurt the multi-million ringgit business.

"This shows that they are ignorant of the impact of plastics on climate change," he said.

Ng was commenting on Selangor's move to ban plastic straws in all eateries beginning July 1, and on Penang's ban of plastic bags every Monday, also from July 1.



After imposing a statewide ban on plastic bags 10 years ago, the Penang government has decided to take the initiative one step further by deciding that there would be no plastic bags for shoppers even if they are willing to pay 20sen.

Ng said Penang and Selangor were at the forefront of tackling environmental damage and climate changes.

"Plastic, which can take more than 500 years to decompose, has been occupying space at landfills which produce methane gas and cause temperatures to rise.

"Plastics have also been found in oceans, causing damage to marine life."

"If Penang and Selangor have taken efforts to ban plastic successfully, there is no reason why Perak cannot follow suit," he added.

Ng, who is also Ipoh City Watch

president, said the NGO had voiced concern over the issue since 2016 but to no avail.

He urged the state government and the executive councillor in charge to make the environment a priority before the situation in Perak became worse, especially for single-use plastics such as polystyrene, straws and bags.

"We also have not seen much campaigning by the state government to educate the public on single-use plastics. I hope the state government emulates the successful campaigns by Penang and Selangor."

Andy Ooi, a volunteer at recycling organisation The Kiko Food Bank, questioned if Malaysians knew what landfills look like.

"People should consider how much plastic they use when they go grocery shopping and think how

long these plastic bags take to decompose. We must not wait for the damage to happen," he said.

Bajit Kaur, 37, said she uses recycled bags when grocery shopping and also taught her children to be aware of the damage plastic products do to the environment.

"My children hardly use straws and we try to minimise the usage of plastic," said Bajit who is self-employed.

She added that the rubbish disposal system in Malaysia could also be improved with better waste separation at source.

Retiree Joginder Kaur Jessy, 64, said straws should be provided upon request.

"This is mainly because of hygiene issues at food outlets."

"Plastic should be banned and replaced with paper bags," she said.

much as I can rather than collect new ones, for instance when I shop at the supermarket or pack other things."

N Loshni, 22, said she tried to avoid using plastic bags but admitted that it was sometimes difficult.

"I don't think Ipoh is ready to get rid of plastic bags 100%."

"We are famous for our hawker fare, a food business that relies heavily on single-use plastics. Although there are options to use food containers, I don't think it is being put into practice yet, at least not by the majority."

"Obviously the more educated are aware but what about those who have not been exposed to recycling?" she asked.

"Having lived in Kuala Lumpur before, I don't think awareness reducing single-use plastics is at the same level in Ipoh," she added.

Loshni also questioned the Perak government's decision not to ban single-use plastics unlike some other states.

"I am sure plenty of research has been done on the damage plastic and polystyrene have on the environment, which is why the ban was initiated in the first place."

"I think we are wasting time. We really need to do something to protect our environment."

Ipoh City Watch (ICW) president Assoc Prof Dr Richard Ng said it was heartening to learn that more people were aware of the impor-

tance of protecting the environment for future generations.

"But more campaigns are needed to educate the public."

"Perak should emulate the Selangor and Penang governments by charging people for plastic bags and put up more educational billboards, banners and bunting to raise awareness," said Ng, who is also Koperasi Alam Hijau Perak (Kohijau) chairman.

"They should engage more environmental NGOs and provide funding to them to organise talks in schools and communities."

Ng said the state government should reintroduce the plastic ban revoked in 2017.


The state government under the previous administration had initially planned to ban single-use plastics in June 2017, but the prohibition was called off several months before to allow "further studies" to be conducted.

When contacted, Perak Environment Committee chairman Dr Abdul Aziz Bari applauded the initiative by the public to reduce the usage of plastics.

"People are now more aware about the harm of single-use plastics to the environment. "The state government has not decided on banning plastic completely because we need to consider several matters, especially the impact of a ban on the industry," he said.

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A NEWLY-constructed weir in Sungai Untut near Jalan Union 1, Kuala Lumpur which caused a series of flash floods in the neighbourhood since March, is being demolished.

The weir is part of the mega River of Life project, where a river water treatment plant and interceptor systems were built to treat or clean river water.

The project began in September 2016 and was due to be completed by March 13 this year.

Kuala Lumpur Drainage and Irrigation Department (DID) director Nishad Mohamed Mohd Shaffy said demolition work started on May 13 and should be completed by the end of the month.

"The contractor did not follow the approved design, which caused the water level in the river to rise beyond what it should."

"When the water level in the river rises, the water from the drain cannot discharge to the river, causing it to flood the neighbourhood."

Nishad Mohamed said the contractor was issued a stop-work order and is only allowed to undertake rectification work.

"The project will not continue until the mistake is rectified. The

demolition should reduce the river water level by 0.5m to 0.8m."

He added that a water pump loaned by DID was installed at the lowest part of the Jalan Union 3 neighbourhood.

"The pump was fixed on Monday and if flooding occurs before the rectification work is completed, it will be switched on to suck out floodwaters from the neighbourhood which will be directed into

the river."

Jalan Union 3 resident Manpal Singh, 30, said he and another resident were tasked with holding a key to activate the pump in case of any delay by the contractor.

He claimed that the residents were promised a pump for every house but only one had been received so far.

"The residents were also informed by a DID officer that 3ft of

the weir on each side would remain as we fear destroying it would cause the walls to collapse.

"We were also told an underground sewer pipe was located close to the project site, and a squatter house had encroached into the river's reserve land which is at risk of collapsing during the demolition," said Manpal.

The worst floods occurred on May 19 and June 11 with floodwaters

rising to 0.6m.

Another resident, Sivakumar Sivanesom, said the losses he suffered increased with each flooding.

"I lost a wooden chest made by my late grandfather and an expensive collection of plates from England.

"My family home also had decades-old nyatoh wood furniture which is irreplaceable," said Sivanesom.



6.3-magnitude earthquake rocks Papua

JAKARTA: A 6.3-magnitude earthquake hit Papua, in eastern Indonesia, US seismologists said, but no tsunami warning was issued.

The quake hit about 250km west of the town of Abepura in Papua province at 12.46am local time yesterday, at a depth of 12km, according to the US Geological Survey.

The quake was felt weakly in Abepura, but most people did not notice it.

“I was still awake at home but I did not feel it all and none of my neighbours ran out of their home,” said resident Arul Firmansyah.

There were no immediate reports of casualties after the earthquake.

Indonesia experiences frequent seismic and volcanic activity due to its position on the Pacific “Ring of Fire”. Last year, a 7.5-magnitude quake and a subsequent tsunami in Palu on Sulawesi island killed more than 2,200 with a thousand more declared missing. — AFP

Protesters urge Asean leaders to ban trash imports

BANGKOK: Protesters yesterday dumped plastic waste in front of a government building here and called on Southeast Asian leaders to ban imports of trash from developed countries.

The protest comes ahead of a weekend meeting of the 10-member Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean), with many countries struggling to deal with the flood of plastic waste unleashed by China's decision last year to stop importing recyclables from abroad.

Countries in Asean now receive more than a quarter of global plastic waste, most of which comes from developed economies like Canada, the US, Australia, and Japan.

A group of about 50 Thai activists, some

holding placards reading "No Space for Waste", joined Greenpeace campaigners to call for an end to all trash imports to Southeast Asia.

"The communities are here today to reclaim ... the right to live in a sustainable environment in Thailand," said Tara Buakamsri of Greenpeace Thailand.

They called for Asean countries to ban the export of waste "from anywhere in the world into the region".

The trash pile-up in Southeast Asia accelerated after China stopped accepting waste in 2018, and Greenpeace says plastic refuse imports have increased by a staggering 171% since 2016.

The imported waste is supposed to be

recycled, but sometimes arrives mixed with unrecyclable items or is improperly handled and ends up being burnt or leaking into waterways and the sea.

Thailand imports waste from scores of countries, much of it ending up in landfills and waste disposal facilities that have prompted pollution complaints from residents.

The contaminated groundwater run-off and toxic fumes caused by disposing of plastic and electronic waste can cause serious environmental and health problems if not properly treated.

The Asean summit, which kicks off tomorrow, has not put the waste issue on its agenda. — AFP

WITH GOOD LIFE COMES AIR POLLUTION

OF the seven million people in the world who die prematurely of air pollution every year, four million are in Asia. That is a sobering statistic.

Air pollution is the main environmental cause of disease. Given the scale of its impact, it is a fitting and timely theme of the United Nations' World Environment Day this year.

Governments in Asia have been trying to address this challenge as their economies grew over the last few decades, leading to increased urbanisation and rising energy demand.

For example, Malaysia is encouraging commercial and industrial buildings to use solar energy by offering them tax incentives and the opportunity to sell the solar-generated electricity under the Net Energy Metering scheme.

But overall, Asia's air pollution has not improved.

Next year, it could get worse because the region's economies are projected to be larger than the rest of the world combined.

Asia can mitigate this by speeding up its transition to renewables, complemented with natural gas and curbing its reliance on coal, which emits air pollutants, like sulphur dioxide, particulate matter and nitrogen oxides.

It will be a massive task that will depend not only on policymakers but also on businesses, environmental and city experts, as well as many individuals on the ground, working together.

One example is the Smart Cities Network.

Set up last year by Asean, it will help 26 pilot cities address societal and environmental challenges.

Asean will need to move quickly.

Some 90 million people are expected to move into its cities by 2030 and it has set a target of 23 per cent renewables in its primary energy mix by 2025, a 250 per cent increase from 2014.

Gas renewables, however, solve only part of the problem because they chiefly produce electricity,

which makes up 20 per cent of the world's final energy use.

Industries like cement, steel, plastics, trucking, shipping and aviation, which cannot be easily electrified yet, require hydrocarbons.

This is where natural gas, which produces less than one-tenth the air pollutants than coal when burnt for electricity, can play a part.

The good news is many countries in Asia are recognising this. While China consumes half the

world's coal, Beijing has experienced the benefits of switching to gas for heating.

Last year, worldwide demand for gas grew at its fastest rate since 2010, and natural gas made up nearly 45 per cent of the rise in total energy demand, the highest among all fuel types.

But this was not enough to offset demand for coal, especially in Asia, home to half the world's population and growing.

Every year, Asian cities attract 44 million new inhabitants, all

searching for a better way of life.

With this prosperity comes new luxuries: new homes, cars and appliances. These are the products of the good life that Asia deserves. But this prosperity will be short-lived if its people do not enjoy good health.

Clean air, after all, is not a luxury. It is a necessity.

The Asean summit, which kicks off tomorrow with a foreign ministers' meeting, has not put the waste issue on its agenda.

But discussions would have as a "priority" the issue of marine waste because it affected "the food chain of people worldwide", Thai government spokesman Werachon Sukondhatipak said on Wednesday. AFP
