Noraini said a National Higher Education Fund Corporation loan repayment discount would be offered from Nov 1 to April 30, which would benefit 1.67 million



"There will be a 15 per cent discount for full settlement of an outstanding loan, 12 per cent discount for payment of at least 50 per cent of the outstanding balance in one payment and 10 per cent discount for repayment through sche-duled salary deduction or direct debit." She said the government agreed to extend double tax deduction to compa-

nies offering scholarships to tertiary students and this initiative had been expanded to all fields of study.

She said the ministry would introduce the e-Start Programme to provide a one-off credit of RM150 into the e-wallets of youths aged 18 to 20, including full-time tudents at higher learning institutions.

"In addition, RM6.6 billion will be provided for education loans, upgrading certificate programmes to diplomas, as well as producing professionals among Bumiputeras in the fields of medicine. engineering and finance under Mara (Majlis Amanah Rakyat), UiTM (Universiti Teknologi Mara) and Yayasan Peneraju. "The government encourages the

private sector to implement an initiative to pay an allowance of RM900 to students undergoing industrial training

programmes.
"There will also be an extension on tax incentives for the Structured Industrial Training Programme until 2025, which has also been extended to students at the master's degree, professional certificate and Malaysian Skills Certificate Level 1 and 2.

Noraini said the government would provide an incentive of RM900 a month for six months to employers who hire school-leavers and graduates aged 18 to 30.

She welcomed the RM423 million allocation under the Science, Techno-logy and Innovation Ministry and the Higher Education Ministry to intensify research and development in line with the development of science and tech-

"Allocations include RM295 million to public universities to play a larger role in the research and innovation ecosystem, as well as encourage col-laboration with industries."

The government will also expand mobile clinic services to university teaching hospitals to increase access to screening and health education in
